How inspirational was Luuka Jones at the Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro. Getting up early to watch the semi and wondering if she would make the final was not made any easier when she did not have a great run and qualified seventh. However, there was that sense of pride that comes with watching Kiwis and a gut wrenching feeling that she could do better than that.

The Finals were a nail biting affair and the levels of excitement and expectation rose when Luuka had a stunning run down the challenging 24 gate 242 metre course with a time of 101.82 seconds which saw her briefly hold the gold medal position. The wait was agonising and made worse when it looked like the Aussie was about to steal the gold or silver but then the time penalty saw Luuka back on top. The run from the Spain's Maialen Chourraut at 98.65 saw Luuka win the Silver Medal. Luuka was left with a surreal feeling having gone from her 26th world ranking to number 2 at the Olympics and winning the first ever medal for New Zealand in the white water.
